Western Dressage

Vivian Mevorah gave us a wonderful introduction to the 'new' sport of Western Dressage. Vivian has been a participant in traditional dressage for many years. She and her horse have competed at Intermediaire I level. Now they are pursuing the art of Western Dressage.

Western Dressage is an excellent base for many disciplines. Its' purpose is to develop a harmonious partnership in which the horse willingly and freely responds to the rider's aids in a responsive, balanced, flexible manner. One competes at a level by level process. Introductory Level Test 1 is performed only at the walk/jog. The step by step method helps the horse and rider develop focus without high pressure.

Vivian also shared information about the new Sacramento Sheriff's Department Wild Horse Program. LBHA Board of Directors Meeting 3-4-15

Meeting was called to order by Maureen at 6:03

Maureen spoke to Betty regarding her resignation from the BOD which was due to too many emails.

Debbie Murphy was voted in to the Board of Directors.

Debbie Murphy provided an update on the Grace Horse Foundation adoptions which are going "swimmingly" \$150 adoption fee.

Pat G provided an update on the Squaw Valley trails and Squaw Valley's attempt to form a city. Plan to ask LBHA to draft a letter request to recognize a formal horse staging area and clearer horse icon on maps.

Discussion on changing Bylaws and/or Standing Rules to include email voting. Kathy brought to the attention the process for updating bylaws with the State. Distinction between Quorum: "majority present = 5 members" v. 2/3 voting from general membership.

Liz Daffner withdrew her previous motion to update the Bylaws and made a new motion to update the Standing Rules with email voting procedures for the Board of Directors. *Dave seconded the motion.

2014 botanical guide useful for equestrians riding along horse trails

After four years of compilation by an expert team of 15 editors and photographers, a new 529-page botany book covering Nevada and Placer Counties has been published.

Equestrians really enjoy seeing splendid vistas of colorful plants while riding along horse trails in the Sierra Nevada. This new book contains more than one thousand color photographs focusing on 212 trees and shrubs.

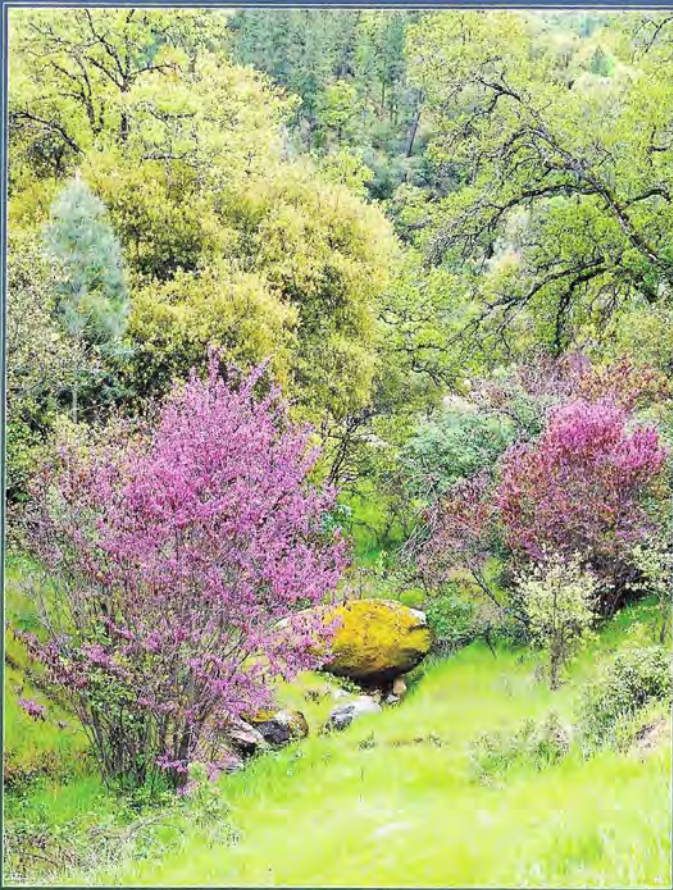

This team of botanists have strong scientific backgrounds in academia, Tahoe National Forest, Placer Nature Center, U.S. National Park Service, and high-school teaching of botany. Several of them are equestrians.

In 2007, a companion volume, **Wildflowers of Nevada and Placer Counties** was previously published by the Redbud Chapter of the California Native Plant Society. The 2007 wildflower book (\$29.95) features 520 species, 600 colored photographs in 480 pages. It is also available from the CPNS website shown above.

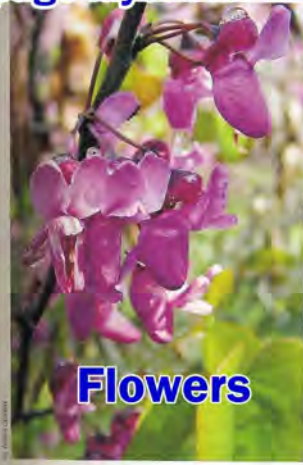
Description: Deciduous, shrub to small, round-headed tree, 6–20', usually forming multiple trunks. Leaves rounded, heart-shaped to kidney-shaped, light bronzy-green when first emerging, but taking on a bluish cast as the season progresses. Flowers abundant, pinkish to purplish-rose, appearing before foliage. Fruit 3", thin, purplish-brown pods containing about a half dozen hard brown seeds, numerous.

Habitat: Below 4,500'. Dry slopes and ravines, often near ephemeral streams, FW, CH, SG, RP, LC.

Comments: Western Redbud is one of our most attractive and beloved early flowering shrubs or small trees. It brightens summer-dry canyons and slopes with its spectacular display of rose purple to magenta flowers festooning its bare branches in the early spring. The abundant flowers extend all along the branches and seem to cling tightly to them. The colorful display continues with the appearance of the purplish seedpods later in the spring. Fall color can be yellow to burnt orange. Native Americans frequently used its twigs for making baskets, and occasionally extracted a slightly reddish dye from the bark. They encouraged cutting production by cutting the shrubs to the ground to promote multiple straight new stems to resprout. These straighter stems were harvested for quality basket material. Most of the Redbuds sold in plant nurseries are not this one, but the Eastern Redbud, *Cercis canadensis*, an understory tree in eastern forests, but the more drought-tolerant Western Redbud is almost always available in nurseries specializing in native plants. The American River Canyon near Auburn and the South Yuba River Canyon around Bridgeport are two places where it can be seen.

Tree, Shrub, or Woody Vine?
You'll find gorgeous photographs and botanically accurate descriptions written in simplified terms for 212 species known to grow in Nevada and Placer Counties.

Think Like a Botanist!
Plant descriptions are organized by plant families. Includes special keys and illustrations for willows, oaks, and pines.

Plus: look for trees and shrubs along 17 local trails described in our book—driving directions and GPS coordinates included.

This botany book is particularly useful because of the comprehensive layout for each of the 212 trees and shrubs. An example for Western Redbud (pages 148-149) is shown above, with large blue captions added for purposes of this book review. Each tree or shrub is given equal editorial space, regardless of how prevalent or rare it is. Each plant is described by its common name, scientific name, habitat, field venue, flowers, spring and autumn foliage, and fruit.

A 9-page glossary is provided in the back pages, along with a 5-page bibliography, including two pages of internet links (for further reading). The detailed index is 26 pages long.

The botany of 17 local trails, plus their GPS coordinates will be of keen interest to equestrians: Western States Trail, Skillman Flat, Edwards Crossing of South Yuba Trail, Scotts Flat Reservoir, Stagecoach Trail, Sugar Pine Discovery Trail, Tompkins Memorial Trail, Union Meadow at Empire Mine State Park, Weimar Institute, Iowa Hill Road, and Onion Valley near Emigrant Gap all have their botany carefully described.

At 529 pages, this comprehensive botany book is too heavy to carry with us in horn-bags or saddle-bags. But it is highly recommended to have with us in our horse trailers and tack rooms. Always lots more to learn about botany while riding along horse trails in the Sierras.

Setting up a Highline by the Numbers

1. Choose an area that won't be unduly harmed by stock – Make sure the ground is clear of any debris that could injure your stock if they lay down or choose to roll.
2. Find two live trees at least 12" inches in diameter and 15 to 20 feet apart – Make sure there are no branches to injure your horse and NEVER tie to dead trees.
3. Place one Tree Saver Strap and rope as high as you can reach (7 feet is preferred).
4. Stretch the rope (3/8 polyester is strong and doesn't stretch) between the two trees.
5. Secure the rope to one Tree Saver with a quick release bowline knot.
6. If using knot eliminators place them now while the line is loose. Leave 7 feet, or more, space between each horse.
7. Create a loop in the line about seven feet from the unattached tree – Making a loop will allow you to have a 2:1 pulley system for stretching your line MUCH tighter than you could do on your own.
8. Run the remainder of the line through the second Tree Saver Strap and back to pass through the loop in your line. Using a carabineer will reduce friction that can fray your rope.
9. Keep the line tight with a half hitch.
10. Tuck any remaining line out of reach of your stock animals
11. Before leaving the campsite, be sure to fill in any pawed holes and spread the piles of manure. If your animal constantly digs use hobbles.
12. NOTE – Keep stock from chewing, and damaging, trees by tying them at least 7 feet from any tree.



1. I HEREBY RELEASE AND DISCHARGE LOOMIS BASIN HORSEMEN'S ASSOCIATION ("LBHA"), THE LBHA BOARD OF DIRECTORS, ALL LBHA OFFICERS AND INDIVIDUAL CLUB MEMBERS AND THEIR AGENTS, EMPLOYEES, OR REPRESENTATIVES, AS WELL AS PLACER COUNTY, (HEREINAFTER COLLECTIVELY KNOWN AS "RELEASEES") FROM ALL ACTIONS, CLAIMS OR DEMANDS I MAY NOW OR HEREAFTER HAVE FROM INJURY, DEATH OR DAMAGE RESULTING FROM MY PARTICIPATION IN ANY HORSE-RELATED ACTIVITIES SPONSORED BY LBHA, AT LOOMIS BASIN HORSEMEN'S ARENA OR AT ANY OTHER LOCATION.
