Membership Meeting Minutes February 15th, 2017

Meeting was called to order by Maureen at 7:00 pm. The following Board members were present: Maureen Henderson, Janis Rau, Kathy Dombrowski, Sherry DeBare, Flo Faoro and Dave Faoro. Committee Chairpersons present were: Liz Daffner. Not Present: Greg King and Barbara Heyward. Janis Rau acted as Secretary for the meeting.

Introductions were made. We had two new guests, Don Witt and Bruce Renfrew.

Under old business, there was a motion made last year to have the names of members together with the expiration date of their membership published on the website. Since the organization has reviewed and changed the expiration date of all memberships to expire on December 31 of each year, this motion has become moot. No new motion to publish member's names on the website was made, so therefore the original motion is also moot.

Kathy D. reported on the status of the plaque for Jerry Potter at Traylor Ranch. It is anticipated the plaque will be in place by this summer. Kathy will check with Placer County to make sure there are no problems with where the plaque will be located.

Dave F. reported that the kiosk at Traylor Ranch has been moved. There is a new design in the works for the Humphrey Road kiosk. The Del Mar kiosk is also going to be moved. The County has replaced all of the old trail signs and they are really nice. The goats will be returning to the ranch but no date has been given.

Liz D. reported on the upcoming events for 2017. All events are listed on Facebook and the LBHA website. There is the possibility of a cow clinic in March and Debbie Murphy will be following up on that. Liz reported that Paypal is up and running. Liz ask the board for \$120 to pay for an annual subscription (1/2 off for the 1st year) to be able to enable the Wix Booking App. Maureen H. made the motion which was seconded by Kathy D. The motion passed unanimously.

Pat Gibbs had some comments about the proposed LBHA Bike Trail Policy. Her comments were prepared in writing and distributed to those present at the meeting. For convenience, a copy of those comments is attached to these minutes. After discussion, Maureen H. made a motion that LBHA formally adopt the proposed LBHA Bike Trail Policy. The motion was seconded by Sherry DeBare and unanimously passed.

Maureen reported that LBHA had been contacted by Alison Lewis of Design Workshop about participation in the Placer County Park and Trail Master Plan Focus Group Meeting. This is an independent company hired by Placer County. Due to the County's size, there will be two meeting locations; one in the valley and one near Lake Tahoe. The locations and meeting day and time have not yet been disclosed. Pat Gibbs will attend and be the spokesperson at the valley meetings on behalf of LBHA. These meetings will not be open to the public and only 1 representative from different associations has been invited. Other associations represented will be Gold Country Trails Council; Back Country Horsemen; Tevis; and American Endurance Ride Conference.

Maureen H. reported on public input on the proposed expansion of Hidden Falls Regional Park. There will be a public meeting on February 21 from 6-8 pm in the Placer County Planning Commission Hearing Room located at 3091 County Center Drive in Auburn. Maureen, Kathy D. and Janis R. will attend on behalf of LBHA and report back.

General Trails Report by Bob Sydnor: Bob reported that he had 4 new reports in the January newsletter. He reported in greater detail on the County's Park and Trail Master Plan, advising that the planning process is expected to take approximately 18 months. He will be involved as the spokesperson for the American Endurance Ride Conference. He further reported that Hidden Falls is currently closed to equestrians and mountain bikes due to the extremely wet conditions. You can go to the Hidden Falls Facebook page to look up current conditions prior to heading over there on a nice day. Even though it's nice, the trails may not yet be open to anyone other than hikers. He reported that since Andy Fisher has been promoted, the new Sr. Planner for Placer is Lisa Carnahan. She is the new contact person, so if you have been contacting Andy in the past, please make this change in your phonebook and contact Lisa instead.

Janis reported that in line with a motion made last year that LBHA purchase 8 cavaletti blocks for use at the Arena, she has gone ahead and ordered those items. There was further discussion about the purchase of a mounting block and where it should be placed. No final decision was made with regard to that agenda item.

The meeting adjourned at 8:15 pm.

Understanding Scratches

April showers might bring May flowers, but they can also lead to skin problems such as scratches. Also called pastern dermatitis, dew poisoning, greasy heel, or mud fever, scratches is not a condition itself; it's a description of a problem commonly seen on a horse's lower limbs. Scratches is caused by a variety of skin conditions including viral, bacterial, fungal, or parasitic infections. Horses in excessively wet or muddy environments are at greater risk of getting scratches.

What Is It?

According to *The Merck Veterinary Manual*: "Scratches is a chronic, seborrheic (flaky skin) dermatitis characterized by hypertrophy (enlargement of the skin cells) and exudation (oozing) on the caudal (rear) surface of the pastern and fetlock. It often is associated with poor stable hygiene, but no specific cause is known."

Heavy horses are particularly susceptible (potentially because their feathered legs can trap dirt and moisture), and the hind limbs are affected more commonly." It has also been noted that horses with light-colored legs or white socks are more susceptible to getting scratches.

What Causes Scratches?

"Constant moisture can become an irritant as it penetrates delicate skin, causing inflammation, redness, and ulcerations," says Christie Ward, DVM, MVSc, PhD, Dipl. ACVIM, a specialist in internal medicine at the University of Minnesota Equine Center. "When coupled with muddy or dirty surroundings, it can be an ideal situation for invasion of bacteria and fungi. Mild cases are usually amenable to simple cleaning and topical treatment. In severe cases, or if the leg becomes hot, swollen, and painful, it is a sign that the infection has become more serious. In such cases, it is important to consult with your veterinarian."

Treatment

The first step in treatment is removing the horse from the wet or muddy environment. Any treatment will be practically worthless if the affected area remains damp and dirty.

Next, clip the hair surrounding the affected area. This will help keep it clean and dry and allow you to apply medication to the skin. Wash the area thoroughly using an antibacterial soap such as a Betadine scrub. Be careful when doing this because the area is likely sensitive, and if you scrub too hard, you could cause pain and potentially be kicked. Towel dry the cleaned area.

"If scabs are present, try to soak or sweat these off rather than picking them, which seems to aggravate the inflammation," Ward says. "Limit your washing sessions to only once a day as additional moisture could further inflame the area."

Ward recommends applying Corona ointment (containing lanolin) to the area to soften the granulomas (areas of infection due to tissue injury or infection) and help repel water. However, do not use ointment if the horse is turned out in a dry lot or muddy area because it will attract dirt.

"Severe cases often require topical treatment with cream that contains both antibiotics and antifungal agents and dexamethasone (a steroid) to reduce inflammation," Ward says. "Really severe cases often benefit from a course of treatment with oral broad-spectrum antibiotics."

Prevention

Avoid keeping your horse in muddy or wet areas (this includes fields with tall grass during heavy rains or dew). Keep all boots or wraps clean. Be sure to check your horse's legs regularly for any signs of redness, flakiness, or irritation, and begin treating the area as soon as you detect a problem. Pay extra attention to horses with feathered legs, since it can be harder to see the skin.

Lisa M. Carnahan Promoted to Senior Planner for Placer County Parks

Placer County Parks Administrator Andy Fisher has announced the promotion in February 2017 of Lisa M. Carnahan to be Senior Planner for Parks. She will be the main point-of-contact for equestrians who may have questions about trails and trail-heads within Placer County. Since Andy Fisher was promoted last summer to the overall management of parks, he has tripled his responsibilities (park operations, park maintenance, park personnel, meetings with Placer County Department of Public Works, and so forth). Lisa convened the public meeting with ±100 people present at Placer County offices on February 21 for the "Notice of Preparation" for the Subsequent Environmental Impact Report (S-EIR) for the expansion for Hidden Falls Regional Park.

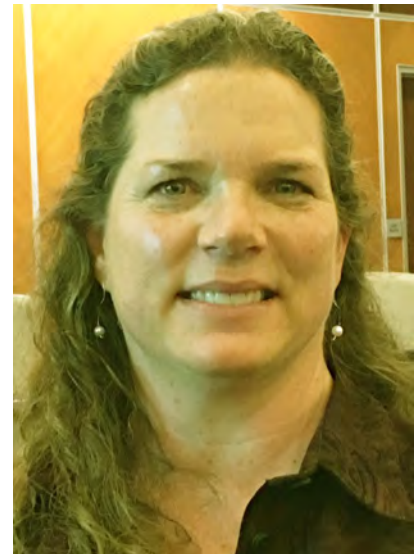
Lisa M. Carnahan has 25 years of professional experience in planning and environmental projects. She graduated with a Bachelor of Science degree in environmental toxicology (with an emphasis on planning) from the University of California, Davis.

For five years, she managed a wide spectrum of environmental projects at her own private consulting firm. In 2002, she became an Associate Planner for Contra Costa County.

In 2006, she and her husband moved their family to Auburn where she became Associate Planner for the Placer County Planning Department. She specialized in large subdivisions, complex industrial and utility sites, environmental reports under the California Environmental Quality Act, and the initial development of Hidden Falls Regional Park.

After ten years with the main Planning Department, she moved laterally to the Placer County Parks Department in April 2016. In less than one year, she was quickly promoted to back-fill the vacancy created when Andy Fisher was promoted to Parks Administrator.

Lisa is the Senior Planner for the 2018 Master Plan for Placer County Parks and Trails (an 18-month comprehensive document). She is the manager for the 2017 expansion project for Hidden Falls Regional Park. We equestrians are very pleased to be working with Senior Planner Lisa Carnahan.

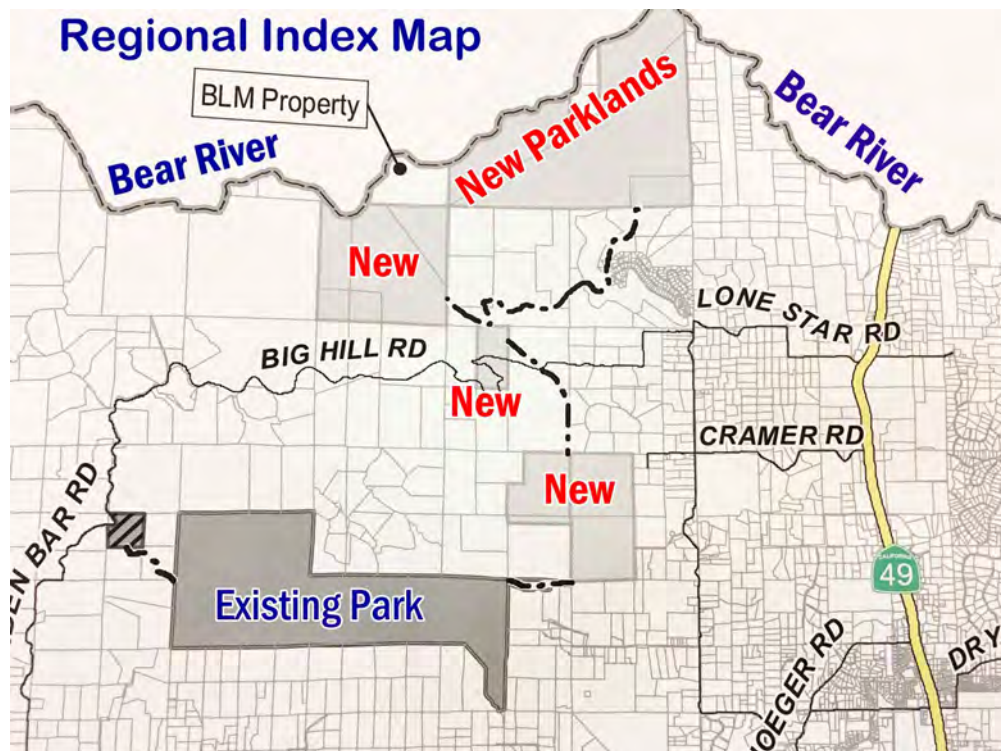
Background: Placer County Parks Department plans to expand Hidden Falls Regional County Park. This would double the acreage of the park and double the 30 miles of trails to a new total of about 60 miles.

There is an existing 2010 Final Environmental Impact Report for Hidden Falls Park that was adopted seven years ago by the Placer County Board of Supervisors. Rather repeat this 2010 report, a “Subsequent” report will be issued that will focus on the new parklands to the north of the current Hidden Falls Regional County Park.

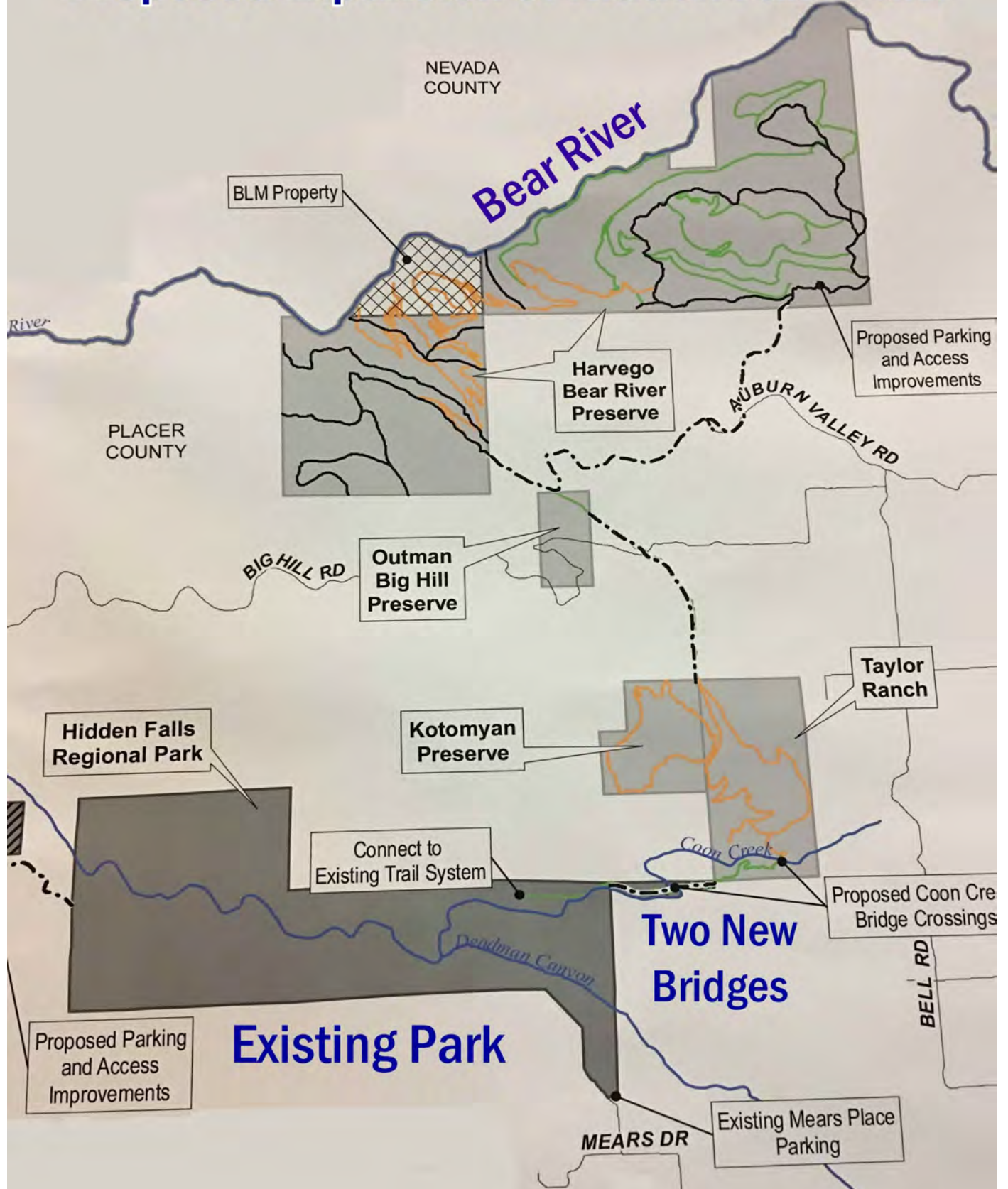

A regional index map (shown below) will explain to equestrians where four new parcels will be added. The dashed black lines indicate linking trails (to be constructed) for the four separate parcels of land.

A “Notice of Preparation” for the Subsequent EIR was formally sent to several thousand homeowners and ranch owners. On February 21, 2017, a public hearing was held, and the scope of work was described by Senior Parks Planner Lisa Carnahan.

Parks Senior Planner Lisa Canahan began the meeting at 6:00 PM with a Powerpoint description of the scoping for the Subsequent EIR. Environmental studies will occur in Spring and Summer 2017. A Draft S-EIR will be issued in late Summer, with 45-days for public comment, followed by a public hearing. The Final S-EIR will be approved and adopted by the Placer Supervisors in Winter 2017.

The hearing room was packed with concerned ranch owners, and several dozen lined-up to explain the sustained problems with the severe congestion at the existing parking lot at Mears Court. Lots of problems with mountain bikers and hikers blocking driveways of nearby homeowners, stolen mail from rural mailboxes, broken cattle fences, scattered litter, and diminished quality of rural life from noise and congestion.

Maureen Henderson, president of Loomis Basin Horsemen’s Association, testified favorably about Hidden Falls trails, but was likewise concerned about weekend congestion at the parking lot, with inadequate space for horse-trailers. Maureen recommended that safety on trails was of paramount importance, and stated that bells should be required for all mountain bikes, along with speed controls at pinch-points. Maureen recommended that Park Watch website (= Janet Peterson) be used at Hidden Falls so that trail safety issues are properly reported.

There is a newly-installed Parks **webcam** overlooking the Hidden Falls parking lot, so that park users can instantly check the available space, prior to driving there. http://www.placer.ca.gov/departments/facility/parks/parks-content/parks/hidden-falls#webcam_parking

Due to the heavy winter rains in January and February, trails are temporarily closed to equestrians and mountain bikes. The Facebook website should be used by equestrians prior to driving a loaded horse-trailer to the park, only to learn at the park gate that only hikers are permitted while the trail-bed sufficiently dries-out.

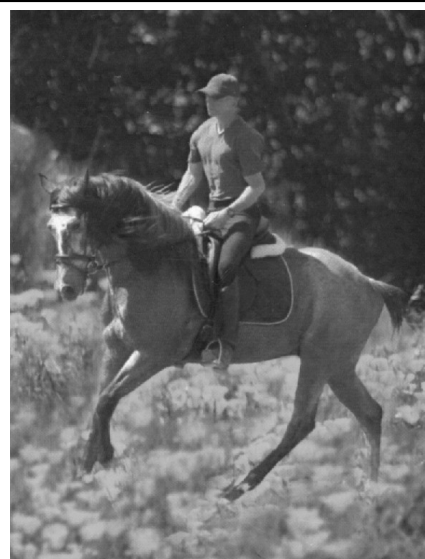

RELEASE AND HOLD HARMLESS AGREEMENT

The Undersigned acknowledges that horse-related activities are dangerous and that horses themselves have unpredictable temperaments which can sometimes cause injury. The Undersigned acknowledges that even the most experienced horse event sponsor, participant or horse owner cannot predict how each individual horse will react in a variety of situations and cannot guarantee my safety. THEREFORE, BY SIGNING BELOW, I KNOWINGLY ASSUME THE UNAVOIDABLE RISKS INHERENT IN ALL HORSE-RELATED ACTIVITIES, WHETHER KNOWN OR UNKNOWN, INCLUDING BUT NOT LIMITED TO BODILY INJURY AND PHYSICAL HARM TO HORSE, RIDER AND SPECTATOR, AND AGREE TO THE FOLLOWING ON BEHALF OF MYSELF AND MY SPOUSE, IF ANY:

1. I HEREBY RELEASE AND DISCHARGE LOOMIS BASIN HORSEMEN'S ASSOCIATION ("LBHA"), THE LBHA BOARD OF DIRECTORS, ALL LBHA OFFICERS AND INDIVIDUAL CLUB MEMBERS AND THEIR AGENTS, EMPLOYEES, OR REPRESENTATIVES, AS WELL AS PLACER COUNTY, (HEREINAFTER COLLECTIVELY KNOWN AS "RELEASEES") FROM ALL ACTIONS, CLAIMS OR DEMANDS I MAY NOW OR HEREAFTER HAVE FROM INJURY, DEATH OR DAMAGE RESULTING FROM MY PARTICIPATION IN ANY HORSE-RELATED ACTIVITIES SPONSORED BY LBHA, AT LOOMIS BASIN HORSEMEN'S ARENA OR AT ANY OTHER LOCATION.

I also EXPRESSLY WAIVE any rights I may have under California Civil Code §1542, which states: "A general release does not extend to claims which the creditor does not know or suspect to exist in his favor at the time of executing the release, which if known by him must have materially affected his settlement with the debtor."
