Trainers must have an Arena Use form submitted annually as well as the proper insurance naming LBHA and Placer County as "Also Insureds." If Insurance is cancelled 2 times or more, the permit is no longer valid. Trainers MUST contact LBHA with the time and number of students that will be in class, 24 hrs before the lesson. 

Dru Barner equestrian camp ground has taken quite a hit the last couple of years with fires, bark beetles and heavy snows. Over 100 trees had to be cut down leaving slash piles and debris everywhere. A pipe corral was destroyed, the loop road is a mess and the tree stumps have to be dealt with to avoid having trailer rigs get hung up on them. This year the Georgetown Divide Equestrian Trails Foundation volunteers couldn't keep up with the needed work. As a result, they had to cancel their fundraiser Fun Ride. What they need now is an infusion of cash to help them pay for repairs to the camp. They need to pay for road base, hire the road grader and build corrals. On top of all that, this year they'd like to pay for minimum security work crew to do help with the heavy work.

Board approves parks reservation system, clarifies parks ordinances on service animals, alcohol and weapons

Equestrian Riding within Golden Gate Park, San Francisco

Introduction

Equestrians can bring their own horses to ride in the western area of Golden Gate Park, as shown on the trail map (above). Alternately, beginning in May 2017, there are rental horses available for rides guided by an experienced wrangler. After several decades wherein horseback riding was not emphasized within Golden Gate Park, there is renewed interest from both city residents (without horses), and Bay Area equestrians (who own horses). The purpose of this report is to showcase both options.

On a busy weekend in good weather, there are thousands of people within Golden Gate Park. It is important for equestrians to study trail maps of the park and utilize areas that are away from congestion involving bike riders, joggers, hikers, dog-walkers, botanical garden visitors, sports fields (soccer, baseball, tennis, golf, etc.), family barbecues and picnics, kite-fliers, classical music concerts, rock musical concerts, visitors to the science museum inside the California Academy of Sciences, and visitors to the deYoung Art Museum. If possible, it is best for equestrians to ride in Golden Gate Park on quiet weekdays (Monday through Friday) and non-holiday weekends.

Horseback Riding Concession within Golden Gate Park

On the southwest side of Golden Gate Park is the Bercut Equestrian Field. The San Francisco Department of Recreation and Parks has invited an equestrian concession to operate here on a trial basis, from March 28, 2017 to Autumn 2017, seven days per week, 8:00 AM to 7:00 PM.

Pot A Gold Adventures has 15 horses for rental rides hat are safely led by an expert wrangler guide. Reservations should be made at **1-844-967-4653**. Riding helmets are supplied. Rides may be selected for 30-minute, 60-minute, or 90-minute duration. Young riders must be at least 5 years old. PotAGold Adventures is family-oriented. There are many parents and grandparents who bring young riders for their first experience with horseback riding in a happy and safe environment. The rental horses are especially selected to be calm and steady.

This company also operates the equestrian rides at Camp Mather, near Yosemite, which is also owned by the City of San Francisco Department of Recreation and Parks. For further information about this horse concessionaire, please visit their website at: http://potagoldadventures.com/











Bring Your Own Horses to Golden Gate Park

Equestrians who have their own horses and horse-trailers are encouraged to bring them to Golden Gate Park and ride on the official horse trails.

The map shown below has the proper horse trails marked. Do <u>not</u> ride horses on the multi-use trails which are for bicycles, joggers, dog-walkers, hikers, and families with baby carriages. For example, many of the dogs being walked on multiple leashes by professional dog-walkers have (possibly) never seen a horse. So be safe and courteous to other park visitors who are not experienced with seeing horses, even on the official horse trails. Err on the side of caution.

Notice that all of the horse trails (shown in dashed brown lines) are in the **western** half of Golden Gate Park (= nearest the Pacific Ocean). When you arrive with a horse-trailer, please stay away from crowds of people at the deYoung Art Museum, the Botanical Gardens, and the California Academy of Sciences (= all on the **eastern** half of Golden Gate Park).



Suggested horse-trailer parking areas shown as red lines.

As of 2017, there is *no* official equestrian assembly area or parking lot for horse-trailers. The historic horse stables on the northwest side of the Polo Field are closed and under repair. Perhaps in future years, a wealthy equine philanthropist will endow some new and modern horse stables for the general public. Stay tuned.

There are also Police Horse Stables on the northwest side of the Polo Field, but these are *not* open to the public and the gates are locked for security. Please do not go there. These stables are *only* for the Mounted Police of the San Francisco City Police Department.

The red star indicates the Bercut Equestrian Field, but there is no turn-around room for public horse trailers, since it is currently being used by the horse-rental concessionaire.

The red lines indicate quiet areas within the park where there is a wide lane for parking, and horse trailers can be accommodated. Bring your own manure fork, and clean-up after your own horse. This is a city park, so be a good steward of the land.

Barefoot vs. Shoes

There's a lot of pressure out there to leave your horse barefoot, but it isn't always the right choice.

Many horse owners have converted their horses to the barefoot method of hoof management. Some report that the decision to pull their horse's shoes was made for philosophical reasons, while others cite economic hardship as a motivating factor. Why are we shoeing horses? Is it simply because, "That is how things are done"? Blacksmiths have been around for hundreds of years. This age old profession has diligently shod horses through the world's wars, revolutions and eras. Very few professions have been around this long... so there must be a good reason for it, right? They wouldn't be in high demand after all these years if the job wasn't necessary. So... which is best for your horse? Shoes or no shoes? From the vet's perspective, decisions should be made for each horse based on how the horse responds to being barefoot. Each case must be handled on an individual basis. Both shoes and barefoot have perceived pros and cons. For instance, some may view the protection that a shoe provides to a hoof to be a good thing, while others believe that the shoe prevents natural expansion and contraction of the foot that occurs in barefoot horses.

Here is my advice:

1. No matter which way you decide to go, make sure to do your homework when you select the person to work on your horse's feet.

Remember, it takes the average horse about one year to grow out a new hoof. That means that someone can cause lasting damage with just a nip here and a rasp there! Generally, farriers who are certified by the <u>American Farriers Association</u> have a solid baseline level of knowledge and skill. They're capable of balancing and trimming a hoof and also making and putting on a shoe.

Of course, just because they're certified doesn't mean they're good. On the contrary, there are plenty of talented folks out there who have decided not to go the AFA route. Some may be certified by the <u>Brotherhood of Working Farriers</u> Association, and that's fine, too.

2. Don't buy a line of bull.

If it doesn't sound right, it probably isn't. Often, an incompetent farrier will weave a far-fetched fictional explanation of what's happening when in reality he or she is causing something to go wrong by not knowing what they're doing. Run things by your veterinarian.

- 3. If you pull your horses shoes and go the barefoot route, your horse should not be foot sore forever. It's widely understood that most horses will be sore for a few weeks, maybe even a few months after shoes are pulled. Often, the horse needs to build up callus on his soles to help protect the coffin bones from concussive forces that occur when they walk barefoot on the ground. In some instances, hoof tougheners like iodine must be applied. But, most horses will begin to walk out more comfortably within two weeks to two months after shoes are pulled. In some more extreme instances, barefoot horses will repeatedly get hoof abscesses. If this is occurring on a repeated basis then the owner must make some executive decisions.
- 4. If ongoing lameness occurs from either shoeing or barefoot trimming, it's time to stop, regroup and find a new direction.


This may require a new farrier, a decision that your veterinarian may help you with.

Bottom Line.

Whether barefoot-pro folks want to hear it or not, some horses aren't capable of being barefoot. It's unfair to sentence them to months of continual pain with every step. If your horse doesn't adapt to being barefoot within a couple of months, you should intervene to avoid sentencing them to a miserable life.

If you asked your horse whether he wanted to be barefoot or have shoes, he would probably tell you that he would prefer not being in pain with every step. If that means wearing shoes, somehow that doesn't seem so taboo. Perhaps that's why the practice of putting shoes on horses has survived for centuries.


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

THEREFORE, BY SIGNING BELOW, I KNOWINGLY ASSUME THE UNAVOIDABLE RISKS IN-HERENT IN ALL HORSE-RELATED ACTIVITIES, WHETHER KNOWN OR UN-KNOWN, INCLUDING BUT NOT LIMITED TO BODILY INJURY AND PHYSICAL HARM TO HORSE, RIDER AND SPECTATOR, AND AGREE TO THE FOLLOWING ON BEHALF OF MYSELF AND MY SPOUSE, IF ANY:

I HEREBY RELEASE AND DISCHARGE LOOMIS BASIN HORSE-MEN'S ASSOCIATION ("LBHA"), THE LBHA BOARD OF DIRECTORS, ALL LBHA OFFICERS AND INDIVIDUAL CLUB MEMBERS AND THEIR AGENTS, EMPLOYEES, OR REPRESENTATIVES, AS WELL AS PLACER COUNTY, HEREINAFTER COLLECTIVELY KNOWN AS "RELEASEES") FROM ALL AC-TIONS, CLAIMS OR DEMANDS I MAY NOW OR HEREAFTER HAVE FROM IN-IURY, DEATH OR DAMAGE RESULTING FROM MY PARTICIPATION IN ANY HORSE-RELATED ACTIVITIES SPONSORED BY LBHA, AT LOOMIS BASIN HORSEMEN'S ARENA OR AT ANY OTHER LOCATION.


